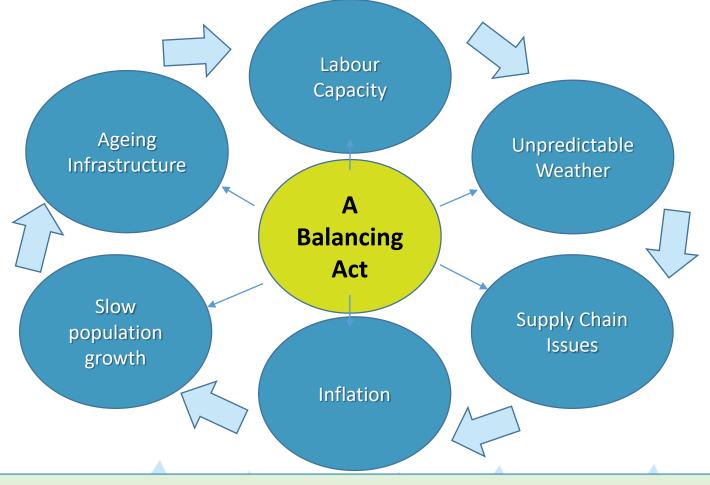

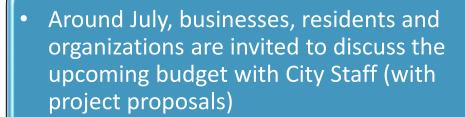

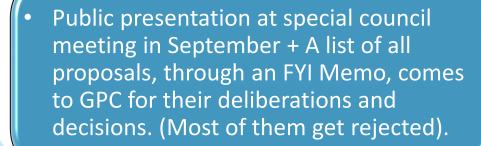




Proposed Changes (1)

CURRENT PROCESS



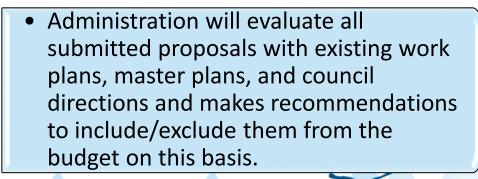


• Special Council meeting to hear final budget request/input from the public.



PROPOSED CHANGE

 A Budget form will be made available year round on the City's website for budget proposals by stakeholders. (with August 15th as cut-off date for Budget inclusion).



 There will no longer be a special council meeting to hear the final input from the public as Public Engagement will happen year round through the forms.



Proposed Changes (2)

CURRENT PROCESS

PROPOSED CHANGE

Administration prepares the budget with all initiatives without a clear understanding as to what is the target tax increase Council is aiming for at the end.



 Request Council Direction on Tax Increase "Mandate".

Administration will prepare the budget with the Directives of Council



 Request Council for another municipal Tax "Mandate" if the budget cannot be balanced with the initial "Mandate".

The aim is to have more strategic discussions

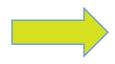
PROPOSED CHANGE

Audit Committee



Renamed Finance Committee

 Audit Committee currently has 6 members: 2 Council Members + 4 Members of the Public



To expand to 8 members: 3 Council
 Members + 5 Members of the Public

 Audit Committee meets 4 times a year on Financial reporting only



 To meet 6 times a year and expand scope to include Budget, Tax and Financial reporting

Recommendations already approved by the Audit Committee at their meeting of June 20th, 2024.
