 Committee heard a presentation from Paul Gruner (Tlicho Investment Corporation), Mark Lewis (Det'on Cho Group of Companies) and Marc Whitford (North Slave Metis Alliance), representatives from Indigenous Development Corporations, regarding the Economic



Impact of Mine Closures. The group advised that they are also presenting on behalf of the Denesoline Corporation and noted that their representative was unable to attend this meeting. The Indigenous Development Corporations noted that today there are 3 remaining diamond mines still operating in the NWT with planned closure dates of early 2026 for the Diavik Mine (Rio Tinto), 2031 for the Gahcho Kue Mine (DeBeers) and 2028 for the Ekati Mine (Burgundy Diamonds). The Indigenous Development Corporations noted that this will affect the employment of several residents of Yellowknife and the surrounding area and advised that they are looking at ways to keep jobs in the north. The Indigenous Development Corporations made several recommendations to the City, with suggestions on how everyone can work towards this common goal. Recommendations from the Corporations included a collective effort to preserve the value within the NWT (circular economy); the creation of an Indigenous Procurement Policy for the City; review of outsourcing opportunities that the City could pursue for Indigenous groups to participate in; and partnership opportunities with Indigenous groups on infrastructure projects.

- v) Notwithstanding clause (i.) of this policy, should the City receive no applications to fill a vacancy on any particular board or committee, the six year maximum limitation may, at the discretion of City Council, be waived.

Consistency

The Audit Committee has recommended staggered terms for Committee members.

Legislation

Audit Committee By-law No. 4127 requires outside members to reside in Yellowknife and be independent from City Council, management, auditors, legal counsel and major contractors. Section 4.a.ii(3) states that the currently vacant position must be filled by a Professional Engineer.

Procedural Considerations



The Audit Committee helps to enhance the auditor's real and perceived independence by providing an intermediary link between the auditor and Council. The Audit Committee limits the reliance Council must place on the technical expertise of the independent auditor.

Committee noted that the Audit Committee is intended to function with a full complement of six members. Having the term of a new member expire in three years will conform to the staggered term recommendation.

Committee recommends that Council appoint Council appoint J. Paul Guy, a Professional Engineer, pursuant to Audit Committee By-law No. 4127, to serve on the City of Yellowknife (City) Audit Committee for a three-year term commencing September 9, 2025 and ending September 8, 2028.

MOVE APPROVAL

Committee noted that there are vacancies on the Community Advisory Board on Homelessness for: Two (2) representatives who have lived experience of homelessness; One (1) representative from non-government Health organizations, including hospitals or other institutions, and organizations focused on mental health and addiction; One (1) representative from Veterans Affairs Canada or veterans serving organization.

It is the practice of the City of Yellowknife to advertise all vacancies for boards and committees. The City has advertised vacancies on the Community Advisory Board (CAB) on Homelessness on the City's website and social media sites.

Motion #0459-96, as amended by #0460-96, #0462-96 and #0273-09:

"The following policy be adopted with respect to appointments to municipal boards and committees:

- advertise for applicants to fill a vacancy on that board or committee.
- v) Notwithstanding clause (i.) of this policy, should the City receive no applications to fill a vacancy on any particular board or committee, the six year maximum limitation may, at the discretion of City Council, be waived.
- vi) Should the City receive no applications to fill a vacancy on any particular board or committee, City Council may appoint a member of the public at their discretion.

Applicable legislation, by-laws, studies, plans include: Council Procedures By-law No. 4975, as amended.

Legislation

Section 122 of Council Procedures By-law No. 4975 states:

Special Committees of Council

- 120. Where Council deems it necessary to establish a special committee to investigate and consider any matter, Council shall:
 - (1) name the committee;
 - (2) establish terms of reference;
 - (3) appoint members to it;
 - (4) establish the term of appointment of members;
 - (5) establish requirements for reporting to Council or a standing committee; and
 - (6) allocate any necessary budget or other resources to it.

Procedural Considerations

All appointments to Special Committees must be approved by Council.

The composition of the Committee was structured so that various segments of the community are represented.

Committee noted that Committee members will assist the City in an advisory capacity regarding homelessness issues within the municipal boundaries of the City of Yellowknife. Appointing a full complement of Members will ensure that the work of the committee is completed in a timely fashion.

Committee recommends that Council appoint Tony Brushett, a representative from a non-government Health organization, including hospitals or other institutions, and organizations focused on mental health and addiction, to serve on the Community Advisory Board on Homelessness (CAB) commencing September 9, 2025 and ending September 8, 2027.

year contract with Dragon Toner for the services of Integrity Commissioner for

the City of Yellowknife, with an option for a two year renewal.

RECOMMENDATION:

That Council authorize the Mayor and City Administrator to enter into a five (5) year contract with Dragon Toner for the services of Integrity Commissioner for the City of Yellowknife, with an option for a two year renewal.

BACKGROUND:

In 2017, the City of Yellowknife completed a governance review resulting in recommended amendments to the Council Procedures By-law and the adoption of a Council Code of Ethics By-law (the "By-law"). The purpose of the By-law is to establish standards for the ethical conduct of Council members relating to their roles and obligations when acting as representatives of the City and a procedure for the investigation and enforcement of those standards. The By-law also provides for the appointment of an Integrity Commissioner: an independent and impartial individual that will adjudicate complaints filed in accordance with the By-law.

In September 2018, the City issued a request for proposal for the services of an Integrity Commissioner and Dragon Toner was the successful proponent. The City entered into a 5-year contract with Dragon Toner and renewed the contract for a further two years in September 2023.

This concluded the term of the contract, therefore a Request for Proposals was issued and bids were received up until 3:00 p.m. on August 5, 2025. As part of the procurement process, the City contacted the Law Society of the NWT to advise their membership of this opportunity, six invitations were sent out to legal firms. The City received one proposal from Dragon Toner.

APPLICABLE LEGISLATION, BY-LAWS, STUDIES, PLANS:

Cities, Towns and Villages Act; and

Council Code of Ethics By-law No. 4976, as amended.

CONSIDERATIONS:

<u>Legislative</u>

Section 35 of the *Cities, Towns and Villages Act* states that Council may adopt a code of ethics for council members.

Council Code of Ethics By-law No. 4976, as amended, contemplates the appointment of an Integrity Commissioner. The Integrity Commissioner is responsible for performing the duties set out in the By-law and reports directly to Council for all such matters.

Financial Considerations

The proposed annual contract amount is \$36,000.00 and includes:

- Preparation and delivery of orientation to Council;
- Preparation and provision of an annual report to Council; and
- Advice and/or rulings on ethical challenges for Council.

The annual contract amount was \$30,000.00 for the same services from 2018 - 2025.

The annual contract amount does not include investigation and adjudication of complaints. These issues and items are billed in addition to the annual retainer.

Under the By-law, complaints and investigations dealt with by the Integrity Commissioner are confidential, except for those matters that in the Integrity Commissioner's opinion are necessary for reporting to Council.

ALTERNATIVES TO RECOMMENDATION:

That the City reissue the Request for Proposals.

RATIONALE:

The role of the Integrity Commissioner is set out in the Whistleblower Policy and Council Code of Ethics By-law No. 4976 including, but not limited to:

- Help ensure Members of Council perform their functions in accordance with Council Code of Ethics By-law No. 4976, as amended;
- ii) Provide advice and rulings on ethical challenges faced by Members of Council;
- iii) Deliver an orientation to Members of Council regarding ethical obligations and responsibilities of Members;

- iv) Investigate and adjudicate Whistleblower complaints pertaining to Members of Council and alleged breaches of the Council Code of Ethics By-law;
- v) Provide an Annual Report to Council summarizing the activities of the Integrity Commissioner;
- vi) Review the Whistleblower Policy and Council Code of Ethics By-law and make recommendations for improvement.

The continued appointment of an Integrity Commissioner will ensure that Council Members receive uninterrupted guidance with regard to their obligations under the Council Code of Ethics By-law and Whistleblower Policy, and that complaints are dealt with in a fair and impartial manner.

APPLICATION

- 1. That the Municipal Corporation of the City of Yellowknife is hereby authorized to enter into a lease for that parcel of land, legally described as Lot 25, Block 26, Plan 1389 and municipally known as Suite 802, 4920-52nd Street.
- 2. That the Mayor and City Manager of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Yellowknife, or lawful deputy of either of them, are hereby authorized in the name and on the behalf of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Yellowknife, to execute all such forms of application, deeds, indentures, and other documents as may be necessary to give effect to this by-law and to affix thereto the corporate seal of the Municipal Corporation of the City of Yellowknife as the act and deed thereof, subscribing their names in attestation of such execution.

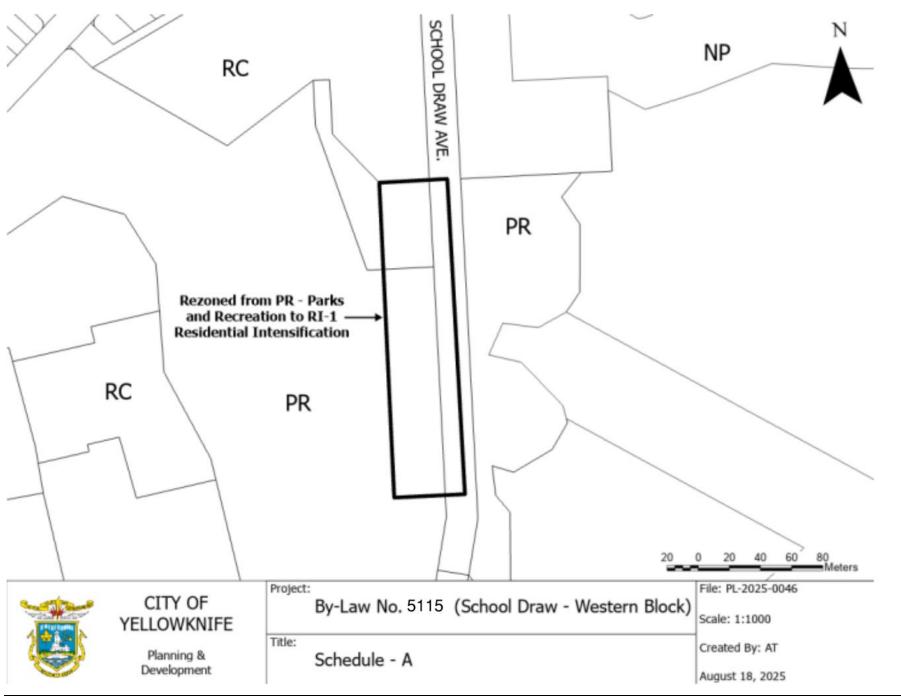
